

The Keystone State Games was created as a result of a resolution by Representative Joseph R. Pitts (Chester County) and approved by the Pennsylvania General Assembly in 1980. Keystone State Games Inc., a nonprofit 501(c)(3) corporation, was formed in 1983 with the help of former Governor Richard Thornburgh.

Since its inception Keystone State Games, Inc. has attracted over 500,000 participants of various age groups into our events. Our primary focus is for the athletes, their families, and all of the volunteers to have a memorable sporting event experience like no other throughout Pennsylvania.

Keystone State Games, Inc. Mission

The mission of the Keystone State Games is to promote physical fitness, sports activity, and sportsmanship as a health improvement and disease prevention strategy for all Pennsylvanians and other participants and to create an expanded, coordinated and citizen-sponsored program of amateur athletic competition.

Robert G. "Park" Parkison KSG Competition Director

In the Spring of 1982 Bob heard Governor Richard Thornburgh make a media announcement about Pennsylvania implementing an Olympic-style multi-sports event and was intrigued. He reached out to local leaders within his community about getting involved and was introduced to Bud Lindholm.

Bob was invited to a Games Committee Meeting in June, 1982, at Penn State. In attendance were the Finals Committee, Games Committee representatives for each sport, and "Park". Bud and Bob were the only people at the meeting not associated with a sport or the Finals Committee. He was invited to be a member of the organization at that time.

Bob worked in the media center at the first Games. The next year Bob was invited by the new Executive Director to become part of the Games family as a volunteer. He was employed by Procter & Gamble and therefore he dedicated his time for the Games mainly on weekends, with an occasional weeknight. His responsibilities were working with the sports obtaining people and setting up tryouts.

He functioned at the Finals every year from the initial year in 1982 through 2008, except 1996, when he worked the volleyball venue at the Olympics in Atlanta.

During the summers he traveled the state attending tryouts. There were two years he put over 30,000 miles on his vehicle. After he retired from P&G in May, 1995, he worked part time or volunteering, spending at least two full days in the office each week.

The first meeting of what led to the National Congress of State Games was held in Indianapolis. Annual meetings were held in a different state each year. From the 1984 meeting until 2008 Bob was the only representative of a State Games organization to attend each National Congress of State Games convention. His leadership with the State Games movement has made it the success it is today.



Ms. Karen Klassner KSG Field Hockey Director

Karen Klassner's involvement with the Keystone State Games began in 1984 as a selector for the regional field hockey team. The following two years she was the regional coordinator and from 1987 to 1998 she served as the state director of field hockey.

Karen's career as an educator, mentor and coach began at Wyoming Seminary in 1971. She took over the Blue Knights' field hockey team in 1973 and helped build Sem's program, as well as the entire Wyoming Valley Conference, into a national field hockey hotbed. She currently has a 660-171-46 record with the Blue Knights, 17 undefeated seasons and six Class AA state championships.

Karen was inducted into the Luzerne County Sports Hall of Fame in 2003, the National Field Hockey Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2009, and will be inducted into the Pennsylvania State Sports Hall of Fame in November. She was named the United State Field Hockey Association Coach of the Year in 2006 and the National Field Hockey Coach of the Year in 2009. Three of her Wyoming Seminary field hockey players - Kelsey Kolojejchick, Kat Sharkey, and Lauren Powley - went on to play in the Olympics and more than 100 of her players went on to play at the collegiate level.

Karen graduated from Mansfield High School in 1967. She earned a bachelor of science degree in health and physical education and recreation from Lock Haven in 1971 and she earned her master of science degree in education from State University of New York, Cortland, NY.

She is a health and physical education teacher at Wyoming Seminary and has been the school's Director of Athletics since 2001.

Coach Klassner was named the Keystone State Games' Outstanding Sports Director in 1991.
